On Wednesday, March 28, the law librarians of the Coleman Karesh Law Library welcomed their professional colleagues from law libraries around town to a lunch with Dr. Samantha Hastings, Director of the School of Library and Information Science. Joining us were Janet Meyer, Librarian for the Supreme Court; Amanda Fleming, new librarian in the Attorney General's office; and Christine Sellers, Senior Reference Librarian at Haynsworth Sinkler Boyd. We were also pleased to be joined by Kathy Snediker, a student at the library school who works in the Coleman Karesh Law Library Circulation Department. At the lunch, Dr. Hastings

brought us up to date on several initiatives that would increase cooperation between the School of Library and Information Science and the Law Library – the pending hire of a legal informatics scholar at the library school and a proposed cluster hire between the schools of journalism and library science and the law library. The lunch is the latest in a series of networking and law librarian recruitment lunches sponsored by the Coleman Karesh Law Library, which began in the fall of 2005. The purpose of the lunches is to bring together law librarians from various kinds of offices to share information and ideas, and to introduce law librarianship as a career option to library and law school students.

The Coleman Karesh Circuit Riders Go on Their First Ride

The Law Library implemented its new Circuit Riders Outreach Program on March 14th when reference librarians Terrye Conroy, Stacy Etheredge, and David Lehmann presented the first workshop at the Spartanburg County Public Library. The program, which takes a “train the trainer” approach, is designed to provide public librarians across the state with the basic legal research tools they need in order to assist their pro se patrons. Over thirty librarians from libraries in Spartanburg and neighboring counties attended the three-hour workshop.
